

New Poll Finds Americans Agree: STOP IMPORTING UNSAFE DRUGS

A poll of registered voters, conducted by Morning Consult for Americans for Safe Drugs, shows that Americans agree: STOP IMPORTING UNSAFE DRUGS. Americans are concerned that the U.S. imports tens of millions of doses of generic drugs from foreign manufacturers in China and India that are under Warning Letter from the FDA for significantly violating the FDA's safety regulations.

Americans want the FDA to ban and test drugs from unsafe, foreign manufacturers in China and India.

86%

of Americans support the FDA testing generic medicines imported into the U.S. from foreign manufacturers that have received a Warning Letter.

85%

of Americans support the FDA inspecting a foreign pharmaceutical manufacturing facility that has received a Warning Letter before they are allowed to export generic drugs to the United States again.

84%

of Americans support the FDA stopping imports of generic medicines from foreign manufacturers that have received a Warning Letter.

86%

of Americans are concerned that the FDA does not test generic imports from foreign manufacturers that have received a Warning Letter.

82%

of Americans are concerned that the U.S. imports generic medicines from foreign manufacturers that have received a Warning Letter.

72%

of Americans oppose importing generic medicines from China.

Americans' top priority for their generic medicines is SAFETY!

Safety is the overwhelming priority for Americans when it comes to the generic pharmaceutical industry.

77%

of Americans are concerned about the safety of generic medicines imported from China.

58%

of Americans are concerned about the safety of generic medicines imported from India.

of Americans oppose retail pharmacies selling generics from foreign manufacturers that have received a Warning Letter.

A majority of Americans want the FDA to conduct in-person inspections of foreign generic pharmaceutical manufacturing facilities compared to just 4% who think the FDA should conduct virtual inspections.

Americans do not want to be dependent on China and India for their generic medicines.

85%

of Americans are concerned about U.S. dependence on China and India for generic medicines.

Less than half of Americans trust foreign generic pharmaceutical manufacturers.

70%

of Americans believe the U.S. should not be dependent on foreign manufacturers for generic medicines.

Americans want their generic medicines to be AMERICAN-MADE!

86%

of Americans think it's an important priority—with 43% saying it should be the top priority—for the U.S. government to establish the U.S. as a leader in the generic pharmaceutical manufacturing industry.

American-made is the second highest priority for Americans when it comes to the generic pharmaceutical industry.

of Americans are concerned that the U.S. imports a majority of generic medicines from foreign manufacturers.
